






# Interest areas of applications




***Each applicant can choose three.***

# Themes identified by staff

About 10% of applicants noted impacts from federal funding cuts as of the deadline of 2/15/25.

There was high demand statewide, with 12 of 15 committees seeing a significant increase in proposals.

Increased requests for basic needs support (food, housing, transportation). Many organizations whose missions are not typically centered around basic needs are now providing those services.

Increase in number of proposals from libraries and organizations providing Public Safety/Disaster Preparedness/Relief and Health Care.

Increase in number of proposals benefitting Women/Girls/Female-identifying.

Drop in applications serving Maine's Black population.

Libraries continue to evolve to be community centers and community resources

Larger scope projects and organizations are working to diversify their funding streams as well as more of a collaborative approach to funding.

Smaller organizations are trying to fill in where larger organizations have stepped back, especially in rural areas.
